

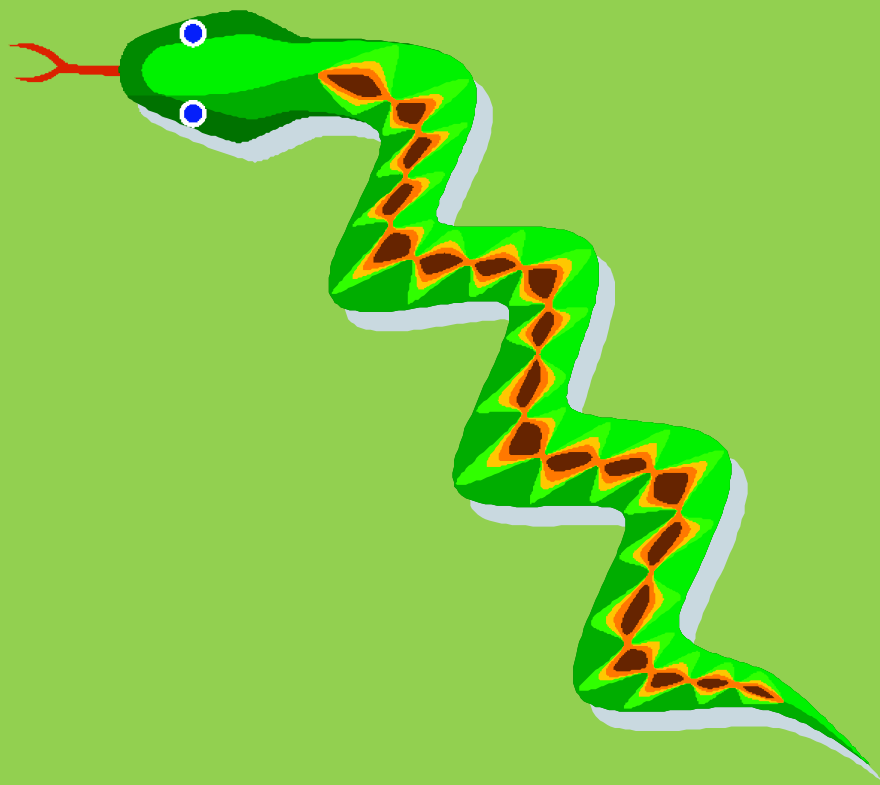

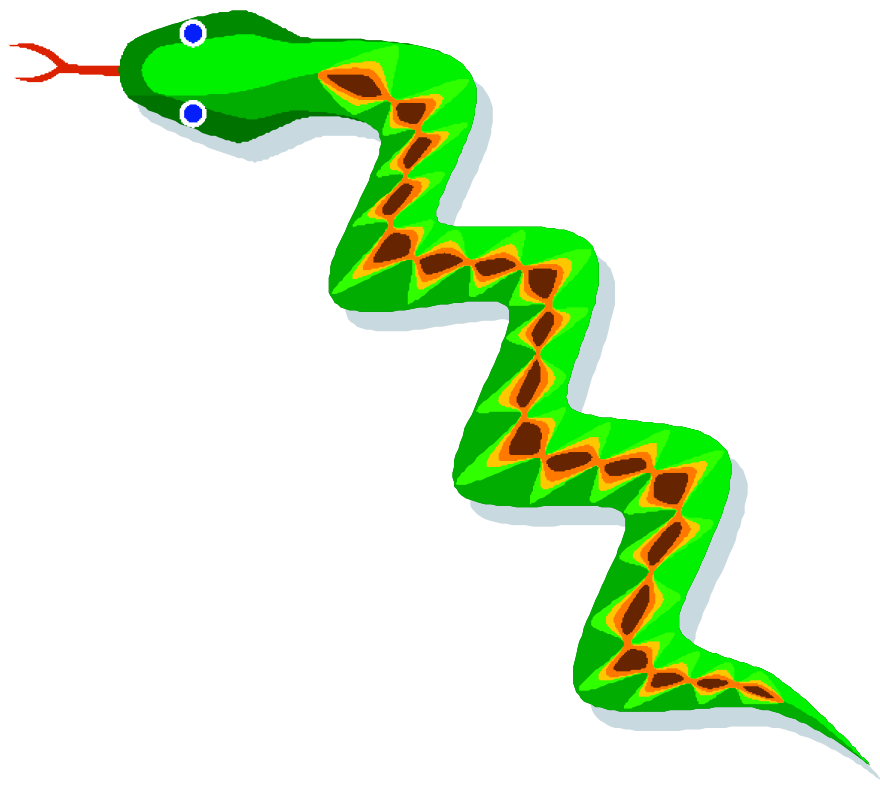

# How to Use

- You can either print the pages out, or show them to the student on a computer, Smartphone, or tablet (such as iPad) for vocabulary development. My students seem to enjoy viewing it on a computer, phone, or tablet, but do whatever works best for your student.
- These could also be printed and used as visual supports to place on a student's desk during the reading of St. Patrick's Day stories. As students with autism are often primarily visual learners, this may help improve attention and comprehension of verbal information. You can print several sheets to a page (in order to fit more than one picture on a page). This can generally be done in your printer options. After this page, you'll find an extra set of the flashcards with white backgrounds for printing.
- This book is part of a learning unit on St. Patrick's Day. I typically do learning units with my students with autism for at least 2 weeks to allow for repeated practice of the concepts. You can find the rest of the St. Patrick's Day activities here:
